RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF ORLEANS COUNTY RESOLUTION NO. 396-1017 URGING THE NEW YORK STATE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION TO PRESERVE THE FEDERAL INCOME TAX DEDUCTION FOR STATE AND LOCAL TAXES

WHEREAS, Congress is proposing significant reforms to the federal tax system, and

WHEREAS, under current federal law there is a deduction for state and local taxes and this deduction has been in place since the federal income tax was instituted in 1913, and

WHEREAS, the deductibility of these taxes prevents double taxation, since state and local taxes are mandatory payments, and

WHEREAS, state and local governments use revenues from property, income, sales and other locally generated resources to finance infrastructure, pay for K-12 education, support higher education and job training, provide for public safety and health, and implement a large array of federally mandated health and humean service programs, be it

RESOLVED, the Town of Yates joins the County of Orleans and calls on the New York State Congressional Delegation to preserve the federal deductability of state and local taxes to prevent double taxation, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk shall forward copies of this resolution to the President of the United States Donald Trump, Governor Andrew Cuomo, Congressman Chris Collins, Senator Chuck Schumer, Senator Kirsten Gillebrand, Senator Robert Ortt, Assemblyman Steve Hawley and the Orleans County Clerk

RESOLUTION NO. 105-11/17

RESOLUTION REGARDING AUSTIN MET TOWER PERMIT APPLICATION

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Yates received an application for a Special Use Permit from Lighthouse Wind LLC for a MET Tower Permit on Tax Parcel 12-1-16.21 (the Austin MET Tower); and

WHEREAS, the vote by the Town Board of the Town of Yates on September 14, 2017, regarding this application was not carried by a vote of 2 Aye, 2 Nay and 1 absent;

WHEREAS, there is a Tolling Agreement currently in place while this issue is sorted out,

WHEREAS, some members of the Board stated their concerns were that questions to Apex from the Board and the public had not been answered;

WHEREAS, the application is a TYPE II action under the State Environmental Review Act and no environmental review is required; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board posted and published a Notice of Public Hearing and conducted a public hearing on the application, now therefore be it RESOLVED by the Town of Yates Town Board as follows:

- 1) The Austin MET Tower is approved subject to the posting of the required bond.
- 2) Nothing in this Resolution, which solely addresses the Austin MET Tower application, shall be evidence of any support or opinion on the proposed Lighthouse Wind project nor any aspect of the Project subject to Public Service Law Article 10, nor waives any right of the Town in regard to the Lighthouse Wind project.
- 3) The APEX Special Use Permit Application is approved for a period of two years with the conditions that the tower shall have nighttime lighting and full tower paint in accordance with FAA standards. The Code Enforcement Officer may issue the permit upon the posting of the Decommissioning Plan Security.
- 4) This Resolution shall be effective immediately.

Offered by Councilman Bradley, who moved its adoption, Seconded by Councilman Bentley

Discussion:

Councilman Riggi explained that this resolution was sprung on the Board minutes before the board meeting and that the Board recently signed a tolling agreement that gave the Board until January 28, 2018 to make a decision on the Austin MET tower. He added that Special Counsel advised that the Board wait for his recommendations before they move forward with a decision. He believes they should follow Mr. Spitzer's recommendation and asked why the rush. He said that the Town has spent one and a half years opposing the project and that the prior 2-2 vote on the Austin MET tower means that the resolution was defeated. Lastly he said that we don't need a MET tower if there isn't a wind project and that he will be abstaining from the vote.

Councilman Bentley said that the Board has no legal right to deny the Austin MET tower application because of any of their Town laws. He added that it does not change the vote on the larger project and that the Board should approve it.

Councilman Bradley said that this vote has been delayed for 18 months. He explained that the Board received the answers to the questions that were asked and that there is no legal reason for denial. He said that if the Austin MET tower is denied a lawsuit is inevitable. He added that the tolling agreement can be terminated anytime by either party. If this case goes to court it is a lawsuit that we cannot win so why waste taxpayers money when it can be spent in a better way. He said that it's time to move on. Lastly he said that he respectfully disagrees with Councilman Riggi and his interpretation of Special Counsel, Dan Spitzer's, recommendations.

Supervisor Simon said that he was disappointed that this resolution was presented so late before the meeting which didn't leave the Board any time for review. He gave a timeline snapshot of the Austin MET tower application progression beginning with the 2-2 denial vote and interpretation of Special Counsel from both parties; Apex's attorney said that it was not a denial, Dan Spitzer said that it was a denial. Next was the motion passed to reconsider the MET tower application after questions of the Board and its' constituents were answered. He explained that the Board was waiting for Mr. Spitzer to review those answers and to respond as to whether or not their concerns were adequately addressed and that the Tolling Agreement was signed to give them the time to do this.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR

Paul Lauricella, Town of Yates, spoke to a resident who does not have access to Town water and is interested that lives on the Ridgeway Yates Townline Road. He told the resident to come in and talk to the Town Board. He also asked that all of the Town of Yates Highway trucks be marked with the Town logo so that they can be better identified.

Agnes LaPorte, Town of Somerset, explained that she attends both Somerset and Yates Board meetings because the wind project would be located in both Towns. She said that the Somerset power plant is closing and their PILOT is much diminished so that the plant has not been a windfall to the Town. She added that large companies in small communities are not a good thing. Their bottom line is always to maximize profits while in operation and that when they close, the buildings stay and rot away.

Susan Campbell, Town of Yates, read a letter where she stated that at last month's regular meeting she explained that she is not a leaseholder who stands to gain financially, but wants the wind project for her children and grandchildren to have a viable future and was told by a resident against the wind project that if she loved her family, she would not want the turbines. She believes that the project will be good for the Town because of funds for tax relief, attracting new business, additional money for the school and reducing our need for fossil fuels.

James Hoffman, Town of Somerset, called the Lighthouse Wind Project a "regional problem" and said that there are very few details to prove that it would be an economic benefit. He asked when it became acceptable for a company to decide the amount that they will pay for taxes. He said that based on the overall investment of the project APEX should be paying 5-10 times more than the numbers he's heard mentioned.

Betty Wolanyk, Town of Somerset, submitted an article from the Burlington Free Press where Vermont lawmakers have imposed limits on wind power to prevent sound from disturbing resident's health and sleep. She submitted another article titled "Why Wind Farms Affect Property Values" and a handout titled: "Opinion: PILOT savings will not be a windfall locally, says Hopkinton property owner".

Cynthia Hellert, Town of Yates, asked about the Marshall Road bridge closure and the condition of Lakeshore Rd. along the ditches where culvert pipes have been left to sit in the weeds and look terrible.

Councilman Bentley responded that he has been monitoring the Marshall Road Bridge and stated that he talked to some of the workers on site and it should be open by the beginning of next week.

Supervisor Simon responded that he will look into the condition of Lakeshore Rd.

Bob Verhyne, Town of Somerset, asked the Town Board to reconsider using Dan Spitzer as their Special Counsel for the wind project. He thinks that the Town of Yates could save some money if they hire the Town of Somerset's Attorney. He added that Mr. Spitzer has worked for wind companies in the past.

TOWN OFFICERS REMARKS

Dan Wolfe, Code Enforcement Officer, said that he had been gone for 2 weeks on vacation. He added that although he is only in the Town of Yates 1 day a week, he is always willing to take Yates phone calls or questions anytime.

Councilman Riggi congratulated the election winners and thanked those that ran good campaigns. He added that it's important to our way of life that those interested care enough to run for elected positions. He also said that he was disappointed in the Town Board over the Austin MET tower vote. He feels that wind projects should go where they are wanted and that the Austin MET tower is a "crumb of food" that makes it look like the Town of Yates supports APEX when they do not.

Supervisor Simon announced that he and the Town Clerk and Town Bookkeeper will be meeting with a NYS auditor on Wednesday to discuss an upcoming State Audit.
